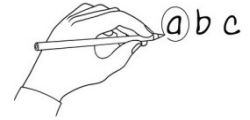

1. True or false?

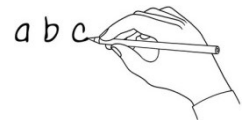


Here is an example of an acrostic poem. Read the poem. Circle true or false for the sentences.
